The Library, Phuket, Thailand You're presented with a lidded goblet and, on lifting the lid, dry ice vapour swirls and entices, a whispering hint of what lies ahead at a place where detail is of the essence.

La Residence, Franschhoek, South Africa The welcome drink here is quite simple: it's a glass of wine, local of course, sourced from one of the surrounding vineyards in this gorgeous part of South Africa. See theroyalportfolio.com

Illa Experience Hotel, Quito, Ecuador Don an apron and stir a mixture of naranjilla juice, cloves, cinnamon and Norteno (a distilled sugarcane-based spirit) in order to make canelazo, a traditional Ecuadorian hot drink. Serve in small copper mugs. See illaexperiencehotel.com

**The Clan Hotel, Singapore** At this hotel, which salutes Singapore's historic Chinese diaspora guilds, guests are not merely served a restorative welcome tea but an entire, though not too extended, welcome Chinese tea ceremony, served by a schooled inhouse tea master.
